
Virtual Kirk Session Meeting


Christian faith. Sustain them and keep all for whom this applies, guard over them we pray.

Revelations Chapter 4: 1 – 9

The throne in heaven

4 ¹ After this I looked, and there before me was a door standing open in heaven. And the voice I had first heard speaking to me like a trumpet said, 'Come up here, and I will show you what must take place after this.' At once I was in the Spirit, and there before me was a throne in heaven with someone sitting on it. ³ And the one who sat there had the appearance of jasper and ruby. A rainbow that shone like an emerald encircled the throne. ⁴ Surrounding the throne were twenty-four other thrones, and seated on them were twenty-four elders. They were dressed in white and had crowns of gold on their heads. ⁵ From the throne came flashes of lightning, rumblings and peals of thunder. In front of the throne, seven lamps were blazing. These are the seven spirits of God. ⁶ Also in front of the throne there was what looked like a sea of glass, clear as crystal.

In the centre, round the throne, were four living creatures, and they were covered with eyes, in front and behind. ⁷ The first living creature was like a lion, the second was like an ox, the third had a face like a man, the fourth was like a flying eagle. ⁸ Each of the four living creatures had six wings and was covered with eyes all round, even under its wings. Day and night they never


stop saying:

"Holy, holy, holy is the Lord God Almighty,"[b] who was, and is, and is to come'

⁹ Whenever the living creatures give glory, honour and thanks to him who sits on the throne and who lives for ever and ever, ¹⁰ the twenty-four elders fall

down before him who sits on the throne and worship him who lives for ever and ever. They lay their crowns before the throne and say:

11 'You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honour and power, for you created all things, and by your will they were created and have their being.'



Hi Everyone

The craziness continues as we continue in a restrictive lockdown story and we are now 20 weeks into this story. The Image above reflects our Reading this morning for I have chosen what some would understand to be among one of the most difficult books in the Bible to make reflection on. It is a book that many do not like to consider because of some of the themes that arise, themes that perhaps do not have the positive theological outcome. It speaks of the end times for Humanity and the judgement that awaits us all. In university circles, theologians would include this book among others that would be part of an overall theological theme called Eschatology

Our generations today do not like to consider that such things might be, that such calamity could be faced by all on earth today. While I believe we should be prepared to confront such issues at some point in our lives, I also think there is more to be positive about than fearful of when we understand things through the eyes of faith, even that which is written of, in the book of Revelation. So I hope this morning we might get a wee glimpse of how we might understand heaven.

Let me begin by a word of caution, that is to say, be careful about how we might mis-interpret what is written and hopefully receive things with an open mind and heart in the right Spirit and I use that word deliberately for our purposes. There have been many stories about a new minister and his congregation.

On this occasion the story is told of a minister who having only recently moved into town, set about the task of visiting his parishioners. All was going

well until he came upon this one house. Enjoying such a gloriously sunny day he noticed the car was in the driveway. It was obvious that someone was at home.

However, no one came to the door despite having knocked the door several times as well as wrung the bell. (A persistent minister without doubt) Finally he took out his card, wrote on the back "Revelation 3:20" and stuck it on the back of the door. Revelation 3:20: "Behold, I stand at the door, and knock: if anyone hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will dine with him, and he with me."

That Sunday after the service, the office bearers were counting the offering where they found an envelope in which the minister's calling card had been returned in the collection plate. Below his message was the notation "Genesis 3:10." Which of course reads," And he said, I heard thy voice in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked: so I hid myself."

A cautionary tale for ministers not to be overly persistent to see someone but for our purposes it's about the way we sometimes misuse the bible to say other things other than what was said. Rev 3:20 is about Jesus knocking on the door of a Christian's heart not their house which was slightly different.

To understand how best to look at the book of Revelation, theologians have postulated 4 different ways of doing this.

- a) The Preterist approach.... Most prophecies in the book of Revelation were fulfilled during the time of the Roman empire.


 The term Preterism has two very different approaches:
- 1) A belief that the text is not inspired prophecy, but is rather a description of certain historical events amidst fanciful apocalyptic imagery.
- 2) A belief that the prophecies of the book are divinely inspired and were fulfilled mostly in the first centuries after Christ.
- b) The Historists Approach... where prophecies have been fulfilled throughout history and are still being fulfilled today. Revelation is a kind of survey of church history, with historical events symbolically portrayed. Historicists believe that exact time periods are specified, assuming that each day specified in the text equals a year in real time.
- c) The Futurist Approach... where most prophecies beyond Revelation 3 are yet to be fulfilled.

d) The Spiritual Approach (AKA Symbolic or Idealist)... Most prophecies portray the ongoing cosmic conflict of spiritual realities and may have had much fulfilment throughout history. This is a view held by many contemporary evangelical preachers, writers and teachers.

Most preachers, academics alike will have come to this story using one of the above methodologies. For my money I don't think I could ever support the Preterist approach to things but there are times when I have seen things using one of the other three approaches. I wouldn't want to isolate a genuine understanding of God's Word because I wasn't to use more than one particular method. The thing that sticks out about the text of Revelation is the sense of symbolic image and metaphor. For our purposes I thought to home in on one verse this morning, that of Rev 4: 5, almost in the middle of the text where it speaks of the seven lamp stands,

"In front of the throne, seven lamps were blazing.
These are the seven spirits of God".

The question I was left with was; what are the 7 spirits of God? Paul the Apostle speaks in 1 Corinthians 12:13 of us being "baptized by <u>one Spirit</u> so as to form one body—whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink.



Perhaps the nuance of ancient language has helped to confuse us rather than enlighten us. Someone did come to my rescue as I considered this and so I came to think of the Spirit in this case referring not so much in the terms of a person but instead to think of

an attitude or mindset. In other words we have the right spirit in approaching things rather that this being a reference to The Holy Spirit Himself as the

third part of The Trinity. The apostle Paul considered this in relation to the 8 fruits of the Spirit being Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, gentleness and Self control. Perhaps Revelation 4: 5 here is speaking not of a person but rather the very attitudes or mindset of God. Any of the great theological Tomes that systematically look to understand who God is and What he is like will speak of the Attributes of God. The image portrayed above may refer to these attributes or at least some of them. It certainly can be no bad thing that we approach things in the Spirit of God himself. The Acronym WWJD (What would Jesus Do?) became very popular in Church circles here in the UK but more so in the United States. Having the right Spirit is something that impacts us all, in our relationships, productivity at work, in our hobbies and interests - you will never reduce your golf handicap without having the right mindset. Athletes at the height of their success talk of 'being in the Zone'. They say it is critical. It's not about luck, it's about the mindset and how we approach things. As I think about that I see how that must impact our Christian Life, how we treat that beggar on the street, how we react and respond to that member of our family who drives us to the point of frustration and even anger, how we deal with that difficult member of the congregation or even awkward parish minister who is uncompromising and stubbornly refusing to listen to you.

Maybe it really is about having the right spirit, being faithful in our diligence to Him who loved us and gave himself for us, having that wisdom to know how best to contend with a difficult situation or person (possibly both at the same time). Maybe it is about having the Devotion to Service, or the Compassion and understanding for a particular situation or about having the Purity and sincerity of heart – attributes that are like the fruits of the Spirit which are difficult to counterfeit and easy to recognise as genuine.

That's an incredible thought to come from one verse of one of the most difficult books to understand in the bible. Perhaps the blessing of God will come when we become like King David in the Old Testament and his great confession and cry to God. Psalm 51 10-12 sums it up best.

"Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me.

- ¹¹ Do not cast me from your presence or take your Holy Spirit from me.
- 12 Restore to me the joy of your salvation and grant me a willing spirit, to sustain me."
