

Hi Everyone,

My thanks to you for your patience as this devotional comes a wee bit later in the day. Our Church service this morning was our Sunday School Nativity Service which took the shape of a Homemade Christmas Movie shown in the church with massive input from parents and Children to bring it off which I am pleased to say we did and those who attended the service this morning seemed to enjoy.

This has been the strangest year ever and in all my 28 yrs serving as a parish minister, I have never known a time quite like it. Up till now we have held a summer mission successfully every year until 2020 when it had to be suspended. Every year as everyone looked forward to Christmas, we would look forward to hosting a Christmas Eve Family Service and Watchnight Carols by Candlelight Service – both of which we have cancelled this year. I had thought that we might be able to host a short single service on Christmas morning instead but, given announcements last night from the First Minister of Scotland and her advisors and the genuine concern about the new strain of Covid-19 being particularly transmissible, I have elected as many of my colleagues in other churches have, to cancel the Service on Christmas Day, sadly.

I am once again left wondering how people manage in the absence of Christian Faith in all this. What kind of Christmas am I going to have? Rising unemployment with people increasingly isolated from each other as well as from family and friends, unable to get out and about, with hospital beds filling up across our towns and cities and uncertainty about the future and how we will all cope, all the while watchful and fearful of catching this dreadful disease. In such Dark times we need something to illuminate the way forward. Eight centuries before Jesus was born, the Prophet Isaiah

announced that "the people walking in darkness have seen a great light" (Isaiah 9:2) - words we believe that God had spoken through him to reveal who his Son would be - Jesus the light of the World. 'We sure do need that light now' as the Americans might say.

Of course our Christina faith is screaming at us at this point to affirm that the Light has indeed come and it is Jesus, the great gift of that first Christmas. We need his light now more than ever as we come to the darkest night and the shortest day. Despite all that has been happening, the gift of Christmas remains our greatest hope and with that hope we can continue to go on, no matter what so on that note I would want to say whatever kind of situation you find yourself in - have a great Christmas as I wish for you and yours, God's richest blessing of the season, despite all around us and I wish that 2021 will be a better year for all.

Greetings from all of us here at the manse.

They say a week in Politics can be a long week. I think the experience of 24 hours in the world of politics can be just as long. I am sure we all felt relieved to be coming out of Tier back into Tier 3 when it comes to living with Covid-20 Restrictions and those moving into Tier 2 may even felt their joy to be more ecstatic. Sadly of course with the news last night from Scotland's First Minister, that the rising concerns of a new strain of this disease blighting the world and our country in particular means we return to the restrictions placed upon us before once again. It has meant that we have had to cancel our Christmas Morning service and review the story of meeting together on Sunday mornings even under Tier 4 restrictions and we will seek advice about the best way forward there.

In all my years in ministry, never has so much, been so dramatically impacted, by something so small as the Corona Virus. Our lives have all been impacted by this dreadful time, some have lost friends or family through it.

Some have uncertainty about their future. Who would have ever thought that the tensions caused by Brexit would be capped by that of this pandemic story. Some of us have family working in the front lines of Health and Social Care, a worrying time and even security of employment has become a huge concern and will become even greater yet in the aftermath. Whilst we have the hope of the

Vaccination Programme underway, we still have to endure the stringent protocols of washings hands, maintaining distance etc.

Our reading for today in our devotional looks at the remarkable moment when the Shepherds come across Mary and Jesus in the manger. Having met with an Angel while out on the Hills they also encounter what the Bible refers to as the Heavenly host declaring 'Glory to God'. They could not stop talking about it unashamedly loud in the darkest of night - no doubts causing quite a stir. It is Mary's response in all this that tweaks my interest where we read that she treasured these things in her heart (Luke 2: 19) One of the songs attached is that of Graham Kendrick's 'Thorn in the Straw' a lovely ballad that points to another time where the moment may not be so joyful - the cross of Calvary.

I have conjoined that with another song by a man called Randy

"I wonder of this Christmas they'll begin to understand
That the Jesus that they celebrate is much more than a man"
For me Mary's quiet contemplation of all that is going on is
mentioned for a particular reason. I cannot help but think that on
that first Christmas the joy of the moment is not lost on her even
for an instant. I wonder if she was storing these joys for another
time when the moment was not so happy and that maybe there is a
lesson for us all in this.

Stonehill who asks the question,

Whenever we face the story of grief in our families, there is a sense of deep loss but there is also a thankfulness for the memories of our loved one, their influence, the things they said and did that remain memorable to them, happy and joyous, times that they rose to challenges of one kind or another and while they are physically gone, these memories and influences remain. In times of struggle and uncertainty it is often these happier times that cheer us in the midst of these difficult days. We should not take for granted these times that we have had or can have at this time.

There will be many reasons why we should treasure our memories and why we should take time to reflect on the moments that bring us joy as we raise a glass to absent friends or family that we miss with many hopes and dreams still to be fulfilled. While all is changing round about us and we are unclear as to what will happen next, the good news about Jesus is - "He is the same Yesterday today and forever", and He invites us to join with Him in life today and also for Eternity.

This Christmas, like Mary treasure the moments of the past and the present and while we may have to live with these difficult times, take hold of the gift of faith that Christ offers to sustain us through them. Treasure His promise, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." Such a promise made that sustains us through life so that whether we identify with what Charles Dickens saw as "the best of times" or "the worst of times", we can know without exception that the Jesus of that first Christmas is with us, no matter what, even to the door of eternity.

I know we cannot have the kind of Christmas we would want to have but treasure the moment of those that are with you and in the interim be assured that there is one who will always be with you - no matter what.

Enjoy this strange Christmas, different as it is and know God's blessing even in these days
