


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Philippians 4: 10 - 20 Thanks for their gifts

Indeed, you were concerned, but you had no opportunity to show it. ¹¹ I am not saying this because I am in need, for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. ¹² I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. ¹³ I can do all this through him who gives me strength.

¹⁴ Yet it was good of you to share in my troubles. ¹⁵ Moreover, as you Philippians know, in the early days of your acquaintance with the gospel, when I set out from Macedonia, not one church shared with me in the matter of giving and receiving, except you only; ¹⁶ for even when I was in Thessalonica, you sent me aid more than once when I was in need. ¹⁷ Not that I desire your gifts; what I desire is that more be credited to your account. ¹⁸ I have received full payment and have more than enough. I am amply supplied, now that I have received from Epaphroditus the gifts you sent. They are a fragrant offering, an acceptable sacrifice, pleasing to God. ¹⁹ And my God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus. ²⁰ To our God and Father be glory for ever and ever. 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Reflecting on God's Promise
Strength for each new Day and Strength for each new Situation

I hope you have been able to enjoy the lovely weather despite the restrictions of the day in terms of being able to be out and about. I have continued to think about the ways in which we can see the promise of God in the story of our current times. And thus far we have been able to consider the promise of God in the Rainbow, his promise to deliver us through troubled times and to honour us as we honour him. Today I would want us to consider God's promise of strength for the day.

It is hard to believe that I have been serving in Parish Ministry for some 28 yrs or so. In all that time I have found one train of thought to be consistent in the lives of so many I have had a pastoral role with - particularly when an individual or family were going through a difficult time or experience. Very often when confronted with a death in the family, often it's a sudden death, perhaps of a child, a teenager or a consequence of being a casualty of conflict or industrial accident; sometimes it may be a situation of mental health or physical Illness. They all say the same thing... "I don't know how I'm going to get through this." Interestingly though, very often on the other side of that time of crisis, they would remark, "I don't know how I managed to get through that." I suspect that my experience as a minister is not unique, that many other ministers would simply reply "Yep! That's my experience too" Time and time again I have seen how people come through difficult situations and a combination of circumstance and conversations with people all happening at just the right time.

I'd like to share a true story with you about a minister who made a house call on a hunch. His Church Officer and his wife had been going through

hard times. While they had been long standing members of the church, they were also embroiled in a long standing Feud in the church, the tensions of which were rising to the fore, his wife was grieving for her father who was the former church officer but had died after a long period of illness, the church officer's mother had died after a short battle with cancer and he too was grieving. It seemed their lives were imploding, and they were in a downward spiral of despair and sought to drown their sorrows in alcohol and isolate themselves from all in the church. The minister had been visiting them both trying to be the encouragement he could be, all the while increasingly concerned about a situation deteriorating before his eyes.


One winter's night around 9pm the minister heading home from the church in the pouring rain and wind and cold stopped the car outside the church officer's door and rang the door bell. Moments before, the church officer's wife had raised her eyes to the ceiling and cried "God Help me!" Within seconds of that happening the door bell rang and the minister was there standing before them. The conversation that evening and the prayer that was raised to God then was a transformational moment for them both and they literally turned their lives around and from that moment things changed, they went from strength to strength.

Sometimes the source of the strength we need for situations is unseen but is there nevertheless. The poem of the Footprints in the Sand echoes that where God carries us through a situation even though we might not know he was there at the time. There are other occasions though when God reveals the means of his strength with that divine opportunity or appointment where the coincidence of time and interaction with others becomes the means by which people are sustained through the worst of times.

Paul the apostle understood this, when he wrote to the church in Philippi of how he could be content in every situation good or bad because he knew to the deepest part of him that God would strengthen Him and keep Him and guard over him. That same promise of Philippians 4: 13 is there for each one of us and we should take heart that God can do immeasurably more than we possibly imagine and his timing is perfect. I hope you are not going through the worst of times but if you are then please be assured with the words of the Psalmist today, "God is the strength of Your heart and Your portion for ever. (Psalm 73:26)
