To the elders and the flock

5 To the elders among you, I appeal as a fellow elder and a witness of Christ's sufferings who also will share in the glory to be revealed: ² be shepherds of God's flock that is under your care, watching over them – not because you must, but because you are willing, as God wants you to be; not pursuing dishonest gain, but eager to serve; ³ not lording it over those entrusted to you, but being examples to the flock. ⁴ And when the Chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory that will never fade

away.

⁵ In the same way, you who are younger, submit yourselves to your elders. All of you, clothe yourselves with humility towards one another, because, 'God opposes the proud

but shows favour to the humble.

⁶ Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time. ⁷ Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you. ⁸ Be alert and of sober mind. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour. ⁹ Resist him, standing firm in the faith, because you know that the family of believers throughout the world is undergoing the same kind of sufferings.

Sunday Reflection A promise to sustain us as we cast our burdens upon Him

For this morning's reflection our focus will be on the promise contained in

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CH3 151 God who made the Earth

1 Peter 5: 6 & 7

The First letter of Peter is one of a number of letters in the New Testament referred to as the Pastoral Letters, where the writer seeks encourage and reaffirm people in their faith and trust of the Saviour. Chapter 5 is the closing stage of the letter where Peter, who is the ascribed author of the letter, is at this point making reference to those who were the elders of the church gvien responsibility for "the Flock under their Care", as he Put it. But the words that follow while they may have been directed at the Elders really have an application for all to live by so that by the time we get to reading verse 6 & 7, (the keys verses for us this morning), he offers some very sage advice and a sincere promise, that when we "humble oursleves before God He will lift us up" and that the promise to us is that "when we cast our burdens upon Him, He will sustain us." When I was thinking about this the words of the old children's hymn written by Sarah Betts Rhosdes came to mind, the

lyrics of which are of course on the left hand said of the page here. Sarah Betts RHODES, (neé Bradshaw 1829-1904) born and brought up in Sheffield, she saw out her final days in Wakefield. She married a


master silversmith and silver merchant. She was a self-educated lady, who with her husband's encouragement became a writer and sculptor. After his death she eventually became headmistress of Worksop High School for Girls. A faithful member the Congregational Church, she only ever been known for one hymn, 'God, who made the earth' which was eventually printed in the Methodist Sunday School Hymn Book (1879). Cleverly she also wrote the music score for the hymn that we have come know through the decades. I chose the words of God who made the earth because of the affirmation it made of Gods' concern and God's care. Sarah Betts Rhodes had no doubts about God's capacity to Care for us; it oozes off the page as we read and off the tongue as we sing very easily. The Hymn itself is more than a reminder of the promise of 1 Peter 5:7 for it also declares something of the majesty and power of God in Creation. Perhaps when writing the song she was thinking of the words of Psalm 24: 1&2 ... "the Earth is the Lord's and everything in it". Theologians would describe her thinking as an understanding of the Doctrine of the Sovereignty of God. In her simple but elegant writing of this hymn she communicates brilliantly, I think, a hymn for church for church worship that children and people of every walk could understand. But the gem in the story of this is that she not only reminds us of God's Sovereign power but of his overwhelming love too. For as she reflects on the his Creative Power (Hymn Verse 1) and his sustaining power (Hymn verses 2&3), she then goes in to remind us in these simple words of the Saviour's love for a broken world. In each of the verses she begins and concludes with "God...careth for me" and in the final verse affirms that "God... will care for me."

In all the promises that we reflect on at this time, in all the promises that we can see in the Old and New Testament, the one conclusion underlying all of these is that which Sarah Betts Rhodes was able to affirm that "God will care for you and for me". (Not bad for somebody who was self educated who wasn't a highly trained academic, expositor or preacher like those who were her contemporaries like CH Spurgeon or Martin Lloyd Jones.) She was a lady whose simple faith in Jesus concluded that God loved her such that He would give her the strength she required, that her needs would be met, that he would give her hope that she could hold onto and that it would sustain her through the difficult days to come. <u>Isn't that what we all need?</u>

A simple thought from a simple children's hymn and a gracious promise from our Father in heaven that when we cast our burdens upon Him, He will sustain us. Have a great week and as always I wish you Good health
