


Good morning everyone,

Good morning

In my opening letter I spoke of this being Bible Sunday, celebrating the work of the Scottish Bible Society. The first ever Bible Society was apparently established in 1779 and called the Naval, Military Bible Society later to be known as the Naval, Military and Air Force Bible Society whose task was to deliver copies of the Bible to their Servicemen. This was followed by the French Bible Society in 1792, whose story was short lived on account of the French Napoleonic Revolution of 1803. Funds left over were transferred to Great Britain and these were used to produce Bibles in the Welsh language.

In 1804 the British and Foreign Bible Society came into being when a group of Christians, associated with the Religious Tract Society and led by William Wilberforce and Rev Thomas Charles, sought to address the problem of a lack of affordable Bibles in Welsh for Welsh-speaking Christians. The news was breaking of how many young girls had walked long distances to Rev Thomas Charles to get copies of the Bible. One such story rose to prominence where a young girl called Mary Jones walked over 20 miles to get a Bible in Bala, Gwynedd.

Five years later, in 1809 The Edinburgh Bible Society came into being followed by the Glasgow Bible Society in 1812. They both would amalgamate to become the National Bible Society of Scotland in 1869 and of course are now known as the Scottish Bible Society. Their simple mandate was to see that the Word of God be disseminated as widely across the world in the indigenous languages of those lands far from that of our own.

Interestingly the military bible versions have continued to be produced. My old Friend Mike Edwards never entered parish ministry as his Calling was to that of the Royal Air Force as a Padre. I remember as young man hearing from him in church being asked to pray for those young soldiers on the QE2 and SS Canberra, two luxury liners pressed ganged into service as troop carriers during the Falklands crisis. The soldiers were all seeking copies of a New Testament and they were running short, and these young men were looking ahead and realising that the pending story of combat to win back the Falkland Islands had left them with a sense of their mortality and the questions they had unanswered about the hereafter.

At the height of Cold war before the Fall of the Berlin wall, the Slavic Gospel Association was a Christian organisation that broadcast Radio show programmes to those of the Former Eastern Block and who also took materials and supplies to many of the churches in Poland, Czechoslovakia and Romania who were often under the watchful eyes of the Communist State and some even endured direct persecution. Bibles were in such short supply at times that they would rip out pages and pass them out so that they all could copy by hand the text before passing it to someone else.

The good news is that there are very few places today where the Gospel story in the Bible is not available. Sometimes it is good for us to think about how much has been achieved but it also reminds us how much has still to be done. Some who are more cynical would ask "How can the Bible possibly be of any relevance for life today?"

The Counsel of the Apostle Paul which we are reflecting on in the church service gives a helpful answer to this question.

2 Timothy 3: 1 - 7

3 But mark this: There will be terrible times in the last days. ² People will be lovers of themselves, lovers of money, boastful, proud, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, ³ without love, unforgiving, slanderous, without self-control, brutal, not lovers of the good, ⁴ treacherous, rash, conceited, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God—⁵ having a form of godliness but denying its power. Have nothing to do with such people.

⁶ They are the kind who worm their way into homes and gain control over gullible women, who are loaded down with sins and are swayed by all kinds of evil desires, ⁷ always learning but never able to come to a knowledge of the truth. These words, yes, written a long time ago, are a terrible indictment on our society today. While we have seen many good people do many good things throughout this Pandemic Crisis, we have also seen people at their worst, in the high office of our Politics, in the world of finance and business, and yes

even in the sectors of the church at times, individuals who have shown a greed over others on such things as toilet paper of all thinks - Toilet Paper!!

There is the selfishness of some today seeking to fulfil their need for "Pleasure" so much so that they are willing to put the health of others at risk knowingly. I am willing to wager that when the second Lockdown comes (and it probably will, although we might not know when), we will have another run on the shelves principally by those who can afford to stock their shelves as a three month supply, while those who cannot afford such a luxury will scrabble about for the scraps or who cannot get to the shops early enough as they are the first responders at the front of this pandemic. Wilma in her plea for help for Carnwadric Church's new Foodbank, cited a very important verse for us from 2 Corinthians 9:11 "God will give you much so that you can give away much, and when we take your gifts to those who need them they will break out into Thanksgiving and praise to God for your help."

These verses help us understand the Human condition and Humanity's need for someone to save them from themselves. In actual fact, the Bible's message is about seeing the recognition that God has, where He sees something in us that is worth redeeming and that is the moment where Hope for Humanity begins.

The next question might very well be - Why should we trust what God might have to say through the Bible? The simple answer to that is to look and see what we can find out about God and I think the best way to do that is again to look and see what the Bible Says about God himself and it is at this moment we come to the text of Psalm 19: 7-10. Written by Israel's King David but whom I believe, was inspired by God's Spirit himself to pen these words, words which speak of the very attributes of God and his nature.

If we can take these things at face value as revealing of God's nature and then understand that although the worst and even minor negative traits of Humanity are abhorrent in his eyes, why then does He Care? The Simple Answer seems to be - He Loves us. This is further demonstrated by His Son and how Jesus lived among us and showed us how we might live before dealing with the one thing that still needed to be rectified - our sinfulness. Thus, the one who had no Sin, became Sin for us and the Cross of Calvary became the ultimate symbol of the Sacrifice of God.

That Message remains at the heart of the Bible Society and of the Church's work, where the words of John 3: 16 still ring true today.

"For God so Loved the World that He gave his only son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life."

Believing in Jesus my friends is a good thought for us to leave on and a thought I trust you will hold on to in these days and weeks to come.
