


Good Morning,



From now on, you do know him and have seen him." ⁸ Philip said, "Lord, show us the Father and that will be enough for us." ⁹ Jesus answered: "Don't you know me, Philip, even after I have been among you such a long time? Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? ¹⁰ Don't you believe that I am in the Father, and that the Father is in me? The words I say to you I do not speak on my own authority. Rather, it is the Father, living in me, who is doing his work. ¹¹ Believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; or at least believe on the evidence of the works themselves. ¹² Very truly I tell you, whoever believes in me will do the

works I have been doing, and they will do even greater things than these, because I am going to the Father. ¹³ And I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. ¹⁴ You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it.

¹⁵ "If you love me, keep my commands. ¹⁶ And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another advocate to help you and be with you forever— ¹⁷ the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be in you.

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
Have you been in contact with someone who has been diagnosed with Covid-19 within the last 14 days?

- 1. Have you experienced any of the following symptoms?
- 2. Do you have a High Temperature?
- 3. Do you have a Dry persistent Cough?
- 4. Are having any Chest pain, Headache, Muscle pain, Shortness of Breath or Dizziness, Loss of Taste or Smell?

If the answer to any of the above is Yes, we recommend that you do not attend the group, instead they should go home, self-isolate and contact your doctor or NHS for medical advice.

If the answer is negative to all questions, then you will still have to follow certain protocols while using the Church premises. You will be required to:

- a) sanitise your hands, using the dispensers available on entry and leaving the building.
- b) wear a face covering, at all times
- c) maintain appropriate Social Distancing.



Our Closing Thoughts on a much Loved Psalm

Six weeks ago we took a look at the 23rd Psalm and in each subsequent week I have sought to see how although these are great words written for a time so long ago, they might still have something that is able resonate with life today. That is indeed the marvel of God's Word as a whole. In the pages of Genesis through to Revelation, we can discover for ourselves the wonder of God's Love and Grace, the promise of eternity and the gift of his Son. The 23rd Psalm has echoed some of these themes as we have systematically reflected on each verse.

Today as we draw this theme of reflections to a close, we finish on a high note. The two images of the Shepherd and the feast convey different but no less important themes bringing one to a place of contentment that will sustain us through what Spurgeon refers to in his commentary. as the "Dark Days and the Bright Days". In the final verse of psalm 23, it speaks of Goodness and Love or Mercy as it is sometimes translated in other versions and Spurgeon speaks very fondly of these words as "the two Guardian Angels" that guard over us. "Goodness supplies our needs and Mercy blots out our sins", he said.

For the Christian these words are an affirmation of several things. It Affirms the promise of God's eternal presence with us always throughout the rest of our days and beyond. Every Christmas we will see adverts warning everyone of the responsibilities in taking a puppy home for Christmas and They will say, "A Puppy is not just for Christmas!"

Our Father in Heaven wants us to be assured that our time with Him is not just for Life but for Eternity. The most well know verse of the New Testament sums this up well.

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believes in him should not perish, but have everlasting life".

John 3:16

It also affirms that measure of the Grace of God to effect change in a person's life. Psychologists and psychiatrists will often say that the only person to truly change a person is that person themselves. They are the only ones who can change their behaviour. In Human terms I can understand that. I can influence someone to initiate change themselves I cannot do it for them.

However, in terms of God's influence, we have to remember things happen on a different level. The Supernatural capacity of God to effect change I think is understated in western culture and society. I believe that God does effect change in a person, he changes the heart. The testimony of that is. I think, borne out in the lives of those whose lives have been in the gutter wracked by alcohol or drug addiction. There are many who will simply testify that that their lives could only change with that moment of the Conversion of the Soul. I have met individuals who would tell you that their families and loved ones tried to get them to change, to give up drinking or kick the drug habit and how they could never seem do it in their own strength despite their loved ones support. They would tell you it was only the transforming power of God that truly changed them and that faith in Jesus and His "Goodness and Mercy" has been the deciding factor which sustained them through the dark moments of going through what used to be called "Cold Turkey".

Many have written of such experiences bearing witness to God's Goodness and Mercy impacting their lives. Their Saving Grace has been the Love of a Saviour in the Jesus who not only gave his life but who continues to exhibit his presence with us in every circumstance by His Spirit. The Conversion of the human soul is not conditional on the extremes of human experience. For some, experiences like that bring them to that place, for others, their situation may be less extreme (as is my own in that regard) but it does culminate in that John 3: 16 moment realising the enormity of God's love and Sacrifice to make his Goodness and Mercy a reality.

The final Affirmation is that sense of Feeling at Home with God. The expression, "dwelling in the House of the Lord forever" is a curious one. Will heaven be a place where we all live in this humangous and glorious Hotel that is also a Church, where we can live with one another and give thanks to God together eternally? Does Psalmist David want us to think in these terms or is there something else being suggested? My own thoughts go to that simple concept of being 'at Home with God', being comfortable in his presence.

Both our sons are now financially independent from us and living their own lives. Wilma and I have always said to them that when they leave home they will always be welcome and that no matter where they may live in the world, that whenever they came back that, as their parents, our hope was always that they should feel at home, able to get up and do their own thing as if they were in their own house, to make a cup of coffee when they want or put the television on to watch their favourite programme or whatever. There are many who will know the pleasure of your company but it is only those whom you trust fully and have a confidence in whose company you will truly feel at Home in.

God our Father wants us to not just to know his presence but to feel at home in it. When we get to that place, it is then that we truly identify with these Words of Psalm 23,

"Surely Goodness and Love shall follow me all the days of my life and I will dwell in the house of the Lord Forever."

In conclusion I came across an image that cites the 23^{rd} psalm and makes some great conclusions which I found to be an encouragement and I trust you will too. Have a great week despite the weather to come.
