

Good morning everyone,


Welcome to another Sunday Morning Devotional. I hope you are not feeling too daunted by the restrictions. I don't know about anyone else I can't help but think many of us will be at the stage now that we are getting fed up with all this indoors stuff and we long to be able to get out and about and to meet with family and friends again as inherently we are, by nature, social creatures and we need the companionship of each other. Living in such isolation, as a consequence of this Pandemic, has had a toll on all of us, for some to a greater extent than others.

For our thinking this morning that set me on a track of thought that sought to centre on what the bible has to say to us about being alone which I hope will be of encouragement and reassurance in these days where things seem to be in a constant state of flux that even those at the centre of national decision making, (in Westminster and/or the seats of the Devolved Nations) all struggle to keep up with and at times find the best way to respond.

In our churches we face contending with advice at times we might think is overkill at worst or eminently sensible at best. Do churches open? Should Churches remain closed? Are we safer coming to church than going to the supermarket? The word 'Fellowship' has often been seen as a very churchy word to use but it is more fully understood in the context of coming together very often for a particular purpose - usually the context of worship but it obviously has wider applications too. In a wider community context it is seen as a word that is somewhat dated. The best literary understanding will probably come from the reading authors like of JR Tolkien's Lord of the Rings. In professional employment and academic terms it is a word that accords a degree of status, a fellow of the Royal Society or as in my previous profession, a fellow of the Institute of Medical Laboratory Science, (for the record that was a dizzy height I never aspired to). They say that you only really miss something when it unavailable to you. How true this is when it comes to fellowship with our own families in some cases and our church families. The one thing I feel reassured by in all this is that Lockdowns do not impede the presence of God with us and I thought we might explore our understanding of that in our reflection this morning which I hope reassures and encourages, letting us trust more and doubt less in our Heavenly Father's love for us even in and especially at these times.

A short poem will follow this letter but in the mean time I hope you all remain free of the Covid blight and remember those suffering with it in your prayers. Have a good week.





Jonah 1 New International Version Jonah Flees From the LORD

1 The word of the LORD came to Jonah son of Amittai: ² "Go to the great city of Nineveh and preach against it, because its wickedness has come up before me." ³ But Jonah ran away from the LORD and headed for Tarshish. He went down to Joppa, where he found a ship bound for that port. After paying the fare, he went aboard and sailed for Tarshish to flee from the LORD.

⁴ Then the LORD sent a great wind on the sea, and such a violent storm arose that the ship threatened to break up. ⁵ All the sailors were afraid and each cried out to his own god. And they threw the cargo into the sea to lighten the ship. But Jonah had gone below deck, where he lay down and fell into a deep sleep. ⁶ The captain went to him and said, "How can you sleep? Get up and call on your god! Maybe he will take notice of us so that we will not perish." ⁷ Then the sailors said to each other, "Come, let us cast lots to find out who is responsible for this calamity." They cast lots and the lot fell on Jonah. ⁸ So they asked him, "Tell us, who is responsible for making all this trouble for us? What kind of work do you do? Where do you come from? What is your country? From what people are you?" ⁹ He answered, "I am a Hebrew and I worship the LORD, the God of heaven, who made the sea and the dry land." ¹⁰ This terrified them and they asked, "What have you done?" (They knew he was running away from the LORD, because he had already told them so.)

¹¹ The sea was getting rougher and rougher. So they asked him, "What should we do to you to make the sea calm down for us?" ¹² "Pick me up and throw me into the sea," he replied, "and it will become calm. I know that it is my fault that this great storm has come upon you." ¹³ Instead, the men did their best to row back to land. But they could not, for the sea grew even wilder than before. ¹⁴ Then they cried out to the LORD, "Please, LORD, do not let us die for taking this man's life. Do not hold us accountable for killing an innocent man, for you, LORD, have done as you pleased." ¹⁵ Then they took Jonah and threw him overboard, and the raging sea grew calm. ¹⁶ At this the men greatly feared the LORD, and they offered a sacrifice to the LORD and made vows to him.

A psalm. ¹ You have searched me, LORD, and you know me. ² You know when I sit and when I rise; you perceive my thoughts from afar. ³ You discern my going out and my lying down; you are familiar with all my ways. ⁴ Before a word is on my tongue you, LORD, know it completely. ⁵ You hem me in behind and before, and you lay your hand upon me. ⁶ Such knowledge is too wonderful for me, too lofty for me to attain. ⁷ Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence? ⁸ If I go up to the heavens, you are there; if I make my bed in the depths, you are there. ⁹ If I rise on the wings of the dawn, if I settle on the far side of the sea, ¹⁰ even there your hand will guide me, your right hand will hold me fast. ¹¹ If I say, "Surely the darkness will hide me and the light become night around me," ¹² even the darkness will not be dark to you; the night will shine like the day, for darkness is as light to you. ¹³ For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. ¹⁴ I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well. ¹⁵ My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of the earth. ¹⁶ Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be. ¹⁷ How precious to me are your thoughts,^[a] God! How vast is the sum of them! ¹⁸ Were I to count them, they would outnumber the grains of sand—when I awake, I am still with you. ¹⁹ If only you, O God, would slay the wicked! Away from me, you who are bloodthirsty! ²⁰ They speak of you with evil intent; your adversaries misuse your name. ²¹ Do I not hate those who hate you, LORD, and abhor those who are in rebellion against you? ²² I have nothing but hatred for them; I count them my enemies. ²³ Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts.

Good morning,

In listening to the First Minister's Questions this week, the First Minister and those representing the Scottish Cabinet in Debate were speaking of how there was a need to enhance the restrictions even further in order to seek to slow the rate of spread by the new variant of the Covid-19 virus, the consequence of which would be to limit our civil liberties further in order to save lives. While I am sure we all understand the aim and intention behind all this. I am also sure that we are increasingly becoming aware of the down side of all this revealing a sense of increased isolation. It is bad enough that one can't get out to the shops and for some the desire to go out and browse has been well and truly extinguished while for others the more critical issue may be that of not being able to meet with friends or Family. In these recent weeks we have come across stories of more and more people struggling with a sense of Isolation.

When I left school I did not go on to University or College as many of my school pals did. Instead, got a job with Day Release Training working in Ruchill Hospital as a lab technician in the Department of Pathology of Infectious Disease which would have been at the coal face of this Pandemic had Covid-19 hit the nation in the 1980's as Ruchill Hospital was the infectious diseases Hospital for Glasgow at the time. I can't help but think I've maybe dodged a bullet there by some 34 years. Why mention this I hear you ask? Well, it is because everyone used to panic as we got closer to Christmas because we still had much Christmas shopping to do but the bank balance was running low by then. Greater Glasgow Health Board as it was then, always paid their staff a few days before Christmas and so everyone raced to the shops with a new influx of cash to buy the pressies they still needed to get as well as the foods and drink for that other great Scottish Tradition - Hogmanay. The problem was the next pay packet you received was not until the end of January sometimes a six or nearly 7 week month in pay packet terms, where the cry of those after Christmas and New Year was always - "Why is there so much month at the end of the money?"

I have always felt January was a long month at the best of times. We wind down after Christmas and then things are slow initially to begin afresh in the New Year. That being said, both Wilma and I were commenting on how this month has felt particularly long and that for the first time in a very long time it has felt a wee bit like that 7 week month? While that is not a reflection on being strapped for cash as such we have I suspect feeling a wee bit of that isolation that the Pandemic has created more acutely for so many others. That got me thinking on what God's Word has to say for us in these moments and that in turn set about the idea of two reading this week and not just the one.

When I think of the growing sense of unease that many are feeling, being unable to meet up, I would sum things up in church terms saying simply, "We can't have fellowship and miss it dreadfully". When thinking about these things I am often drawn to Psalm 139 where David captures beautifully not only the nature of the human condition but also some of the major attributes of God. When I read Psalm 139 I cannot help but think of Jonah chapter 1 which begins one of the most well known Old Testament stories which has been the subject of much discussion in some academic circles where the views about who Jonah was whether the story was true or a parable, etc goes on. For our purposes this morning it is the story of a man who runs away from God and his Calling to Him. I am sure we have all heard as the song begins, "Listen to my tale of Jonah and the Whale- Where ?

Way down in the middle of the Ocean."

It in essence, captures the thrust of the thoughts expressed by David when He asks the question "Where Can I go from your Spirit?" (Psalm 139:7) and then explores what Jonah tried to do - to get as far away from God as Possible. It is in these words that we can see an understanding of both the Omnipotence as well as the Omniscience of God. These words are such a treasure for us that that the Prince of Preachers, Charles Haddon Spurgeon referred to Psalm 139," "One of the most notable of the sacred hymns. It sings the omniscience and omnipresence of God... Like a Pharos, (Lighthouse) this holy song casts a clear light even to the uttermost parts of the sea, and warns its against that practical atheism which ignores the presence of God, and so makes shipwreck of the soul." (A **Treasury of David**) **Dr EJ Young sees Ps 139 as** "one of the grandest of all the Psalms, for it brings us face to face with the majesty and power of God. Immediately it exalts God as all knowing and omnipresent, and clearly shows that all of man's life is in God's hands."

John R W Stott, the Church of England clergyman and scholar sees Ps139 as "the Crown of all Psalms". There are 3 things to see in these words of the Psalmist, King David. The first thing to comprehend is God's capacity to anticipate our thoughts. (Verse 2: You perceive my thoughts from afar) The second is to comprehend how God can anticipate our every action, (Verse 3: You are familiar with all my ways)

while the third is that we should comprehend that God can anticipate every word we will say, (verse 4: *Before a word is on my tongue you, LORD, know it completely*)

How we think, What we do, and what we say, God already knows. The great attribute of God Almighty to be all knowing (Omniscient). So when we are filled with the sense of negativity that Isolation, or filled with anguish as a result of physical or mental illness, or troubled by the anxieties and pressures that this world has foisted upon us in these quite literally Dark Days, god our father understands our situation fully and his promise to us is the same as was given to Moses and Joshua ("I will never leave You nor forsake you" : 1 Chronicles 28: 20), or in the same way that Jesus in commissioning his disciples said, "Lo, I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 20: 28)

We should hold on to that thought when such feelings of isolation crowd in on us and take the promise of God to heart this day and be encouraged in that promise despite the restrictions and the long month of January.

Great words for us from God's Word to treasure and hold on to as we face the week ahead and all it entails the good and the bad.
