A 7ime for Reflection When God Speaks: What do we hear, are we even listening?

Good morning,

In our Reflection this morning, I have once again turned to the Psalms which I have always felt to be a rich seem of inspired thought covering the means by which we come to understand the very nature and character of God Himself as well as revealing much about the nature of the Human condition, everything ranging from the highest accolade to the most critical and damming of observations. The Psalms of course have held a high place in the tradition of the Church in Scotland where they became the sole means of appropriate church worship. While most of the other mainstream Christian Denominations, have made the leap into more diverse worship, it has only been in the last Decade or so that the Free Church of Scotland have finally moved away from this whilst also allowing the use of musical instruments for the purpose of Worship, a truly revolutionary step for them.

The great temptation throughout these weeks and months since March last year has been to just stay within the book of the Psalms ignoring the richness of God's Word elsewhere in the Old and New Testament. This Sunday however, we return to visit the psalms and in particular Psalm 62 which I hope will leave us with a number of thoughts that we can be encouraged in, challenged by and reassured from. A Wise elder of my home church many years ago said that it was always important to understand the context of what was written in God's Word and that may be particularly important for us when it comes to the reading of Psalm 62.

An American preacher Stephen J Cole, sets the scene for us nicely when in a sermon to his congregation on California said this,

"In 1777, Dr. William Dodd, a London clergyman, was condemned to be hanged for forgery. When his last sermon, delivered in prison, was published, a friend commented to Samuel Johnson that the effort was far better than he had thought the man capable of. Dr.

Johnson replied, "Depend upon it, when a man knows he is to be hanged in a fortnight, it concentrates his mind wonderfully."

The difficulty with applying Psalm 62 is that very few of us have ever been in the desperate straits that David was in and so we cannot truly relate to what he says here. Evil men were threatening David's life and scheming how, not only to topple him as king, but also how to kill him.

A few times in the past 32 years, people have tried to get me fired. But I've always joked to Marla, "At least they're only after my job. So far no one has threatened my life!" But they were trying to murder David. They were saying, "He's like a leaning wall or tottering fence. Just push and he'll go down!" Under that real threat of death, David's mind was wonderfully concentrated to write this psalm. "

When you think about it the problems of the Machiavellian Assassination is not something that we are quite offay with these days. Our Sovereign, Queen Elizabeth II, does not have to worry about these things in these days. Probably the turmoil of American politics is the nearest we have come to see such things come to pass ... nearly.

In Psalm 62, we read how King David is clearly under threat not just to have a night of the long knives for one's political career but for his life. I am sure that with King David's life under threat and Dr William Dodd about to be hanged for his crimes, that their minds indeed, were truly and 'Wonderfully Concentrated'. What can we learn from Psalm 62? In answer, I think there are 4 simple thoughts to realise.

Firstly that in times of crisis, concern and worry, the Soul Can Rest in God Alone (Verse 1). Being in a place of imminent threat does tend to focus the mind. David could have been concerned with ensuring that his security was 100% protected. He could have been launching a scathing investigation of his court to see who he can trust and who he can't. In this stressful and uncertain time we read the one thing he could be certain of was the relationship that He enjoyed with his Heavenly Father and so verse 1 begins the psalm in a very affirming way - "My Soul Rests in God Alone". In the uncertainty and stress of these times, locked in for fear of contracting a life threatening illness, unsure of who you can meet up and not get a fine for having done so or be fearful about where you can go and know that you will be safe from infection. For some of us as we get older, we lose confidence in being able to go out, some even speak of not having her same confidence they once enjoyed in the work place. Whatever challenges we face, the confidence of the Psalmist is one for us to take on board - our souls can rest in the love of God our Father and his love grace upon us.

The Second thing that we can take from the Psalm is found in Verse 5;

Yes, my soul, find rest in God; my hope comes from him. In times where we find there is enormous concern about the mental health of the nation particularly in relation to conditions of Depression, etc. Many have found this a truly uncertain time and you can understand why. Rightly so, many health and social care professionals have been offered counselling given the enormous loss of life they have had to deal with in these unpredictable times of this awful health crisis. For others as they see jobs lost, loved ones become ill and sadly all too often many, all too many, have become part of that large circle of people across the nations of the UK who have seen loved ones lost to this illness. What hope is there to offer in all this? Can Christian Faith have something to contribute? Well, I believe that Christian Faith can offer hope and that even just having hope itself offers something to hold on to. The Hope that God understands what we are going through, the hope that God is a consistency for us when everything else around us is in a state uncertain flux, the Hope that God in his goodness can fulfil the promises of God's Word to us, the hope that God can do what no-one else can, - take us through the very door of Death itself.

"Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death,
I will fear no evil, for You are with me;
Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me.

(Psalm 23:4)

Thirdly, <u>Our souls can rest in God As we Trust in Him.</u>
"Trust in him at all times, you people; pour out your hearts to him,
for God is our refuge. (Ps 62: 8)

Who does King David trust in his circumstances? Will they tell him what he needs to hear or only what he wants to hear? The former President of the United States, Donald Trump, in the 4 years of his Presidency, was constantly changing people in office. I do not remember hearing of a President in the United States before him having such a high turnover of staff. I have often wondered to myself - who did he Trust? That's not just the story of Presidents and Monarchs however. Doctors, lawyers and ministers are among some of the great professions for whom the issue of being able to trust them for their confidentiality is a must and when that trust is broken their credibility is very often difficult to restore. It goes further than that though. The closest Friendship and relationships are built on trust. I wonder how many marriages have faltered as a consequence of the failure of one or both to maintain their trust and have trust in their other half. Even if there is a circumstance that you feel you could not unburden yourself to the person you have loved, there is

one to whom you can go and who will never break that trust with You. God our Father is one in whom you can do as the Psalmist King David suggests, to "pour out your hearts to him". He will never breach that trust - why? Because in Him You can depend, you can trust and you can have faith.

Finally, in the penultimate verse we read - "One thing God has spoken, two things I have heard...", our Soul can listen for His Voice. The psalmist writes of how in listening for God to speak, he heard two things, that God is all powerful and that his love is unfailing and he concludes that God has the capacity to judge fairly - something that we should and can be reassured by. How do we hear God's Voice in these times that we live? Classically, we can see God speak to us through the life and teaching of His Son Jesus which is why the Gospel accounts of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John are so important. The follow on of that is of course the assuredness of the Old and New Testament as a whole to offer something of the voice of God for us to heed - that's why we call it God's Word after all. The input of the very Spirit of God himself is not to undermined, Paul the apostle and other writers of those moments when he will speak to our hearts directly in what he called a Word of Knowledge and Prophecy. The life of the Church across the years and centuries as well as the lives of our brothers and sisters in Christ all are means by which God has spoken to us. There has always been the still small voice of God that can speak to our hearts too. There will be other means by which God continues to speak to us perhaps the most easily taken for granted is that precious gift of the Holy Spirit - Sanctified Common Sense. It is plain to see after all that you do not need to try murder first, to know that it's wrong - common sense tells you that already.

So there we have it for this week, in times of crisis and uncertainty, Rest in God, his power and his love. Place your Hope in God and set your trust in God knowing that He will speak to You.
