

bible study method

READ Read and reread the passage with an open heart, asking the Holy Spirit to speak to you. As you read ask:
 - What is happening in the passage? What things are emphasized, repeated, related?
 - What do you see about God? What is God doing in this passage?
 - What do you see about man?

EXAMINE Spend some time reflecting. Ask yourself these questions, and write down your thoughts:
 - What is going on in the passage?
 - Who is writing and who is he writing to?
 - When was the author writing?
 - What are the circumstances the author is addressing?
 - Does the writer mention anything that might indicate his purpose or intent?
 - How do you think the author wants his audience to respond?

APPLY Meditate on what God is saying to you and how it affects your life. Ask yourself these questions:
 - Is there a truth to believe? Sin to repent of? A promise to claim? A command to follow?
 - What things need to change in light of this text?
 - How will I live differently and be different because of what I just read?

PRAY Pray through the passage and your application, asking God to change your heart and to change your life based on the time you've spent in God's Word.




Do Not Worry

An Autumn Reflection Matthew 6: 25 - 34



Good morning,

As many of you will know the Church of Scotland nationally, like the rest of us, has been impacted by this Covid pandemic in ways that no-one could have foreseen and that some serious challenges lie ahead for the Church as a whole. Those in our Presbytery are currently struggling with the horns of a dilemma having been instructed to put a plan in place in the next 18 months with a vision of how they continue to flourish congregationally with a reduction in personnel from 143 posts to 84 potentially impacting ministers and ministry development support workers in full time service and part time service.

As they begin to review the story of all this, they elected to send to every church a survey about church life, what goes on and how things are going. There were however, at least to my mind, a number of inane questions being asked. For example, one question asked was,

“What would be the impact on your community if your church was not there?”

In our reply on behalf of Park Church we suggested that, *“there would be riots in the streets!”* The reality is - a question like that is unquantifiable. You may be pleased to know we told them that as well. The survey later asks the question,

“As a Church, where do you think you will be in ten years’ time?”

Our reply in response to that question was ...

“Let’s try not to micro manage the future. That’s the task of our Father in Heaven”.

We then proceeded to suggest a good reason why we should take that line by citing the words of Matthew 6: 33-34.

“³³ But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. ³⁴ Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.

These are after all, Wise words from the Master himself.

In thinking about what to bring before you this day, I thought to share some thoughts with respect to that part of the great Sermon on the Mount.

It offers us some reassurances about how we should look to the future and guidance about how to deal with the present. As a piece of writing, the Sermon on the Mount begins with the Beatitudes in Chapter 5 and finishes in Chapter 7 offering guidance on the avoidance of judging others, being wary of false teachers and bad examples, discerning who are true and who are false disciples and finally assessing the need for building one's life on a firm foundation. The Sermon on the Mount is regarded as having centred on the core issues facing humanity not just then when Jesus walked this earth but across the centuries of time till now where these issues still remain at heart problematic for Humanity as a whole as well as in the case of individuals. They are seen by many across the Church as some of the most precious parts of the Bible because they have recorded for the benefit of all some of the central teaching of Jesus himself. So often we read about Jesus having taught the disciples or the people without us knowing what it was he taught. Matthew 5 - 7 remains a nugget of gold for us to pour over in that respect.

Having come through what is now moving towards 2 yrs of uncertainty with many having feared for our own lives as well as fearing for the lives of family members sitting at the heart of all this, it seemed to me that we could do with being reminded of what Jesus had to say about Worry and Anxiety, fear and distress and with that in mind I read Matthew Chapter 6 again with these words from verses 25 - 34 drawing Chapter 6 - the middle section of the Sermon to a close.

There are at least three things that stand out in these 9 verses.

- a) These words remind us that God is He who provides
- b) These words remind us that God is Sovereign over his Creation
- c) These words remind us why Faith should overrule Doubt and/or Fear.

Let's review each of these thoughts then.

a) **God is He who Provides**

Systematic theology is the discipline of Christian theology that formulates an orderly, rational, and coherent account of the doctrines of the Christian faith. It addresses issues such as what the Bible teaches about certain topics or what is true about God and His universe. Part of the method of study looks at the Characteristics or Attributes of God, the features of his nature and how such Attributes are found in references to God's name in the Old and New Testament. As 'the Great Provider' He is El Jireh and read about this attribute as early on in the story of the Bible when reading about Abraham and Isaac in Genesis Ch 22 and that moment of real testing where God prevents Abraham from sacrificing his Son Isaac at the last minute. Earlier as Isaac and Abraham are walking up the mountainside alone, Isaac asks where the sacrifice is. They have the Wood to build the altar but no sacrificial lamb. Abraham answers him by saying "God will Provide"

and as the story draws to its conclusion with the provision of a Ram in the thicket, they leave that place that would be thereafter known as "The Lord Will Provide". The birds of the Field don't sow or reap or store in Barns and yet God feeds them - said Jesus. (Matt 6: 26)

We sometimes forget how God has an amazing capacity to provide for our needs. Many will remember how Park Church supported a Deaconess from Faifley Parish Church who went out to Malawi for a year. She worked in a church there looking to help set up a Sunday School programme and was so successful, she had several hundred children who would walk for miles from all around to come to church and afterwards they would enjoy lunch together. On one occasion there was a particular problem. The money had run out and they had two hundred mouths to feed later that week. Unclear as to how best they resolve the problem they met to pray about it. Meanwhile not realising what was going on several thousand miles away in Giffnock the Park Church there had been a retiral offering had been taken resulting in a considerable sum of money sent by cheque that was despatched to Malawi arriving timeously so that they could have mouths fed and a Sunday School provided for that Sunday. For those in the Church that weekend they saw the hand of God's Provision at Work. For them the words of the Apostle Paul rang true, *"And my God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus."* (Philippians 4: 19) Those in Malawi then experienced the same as Abraham himself at the side of the mountain that became known as the Lord Will Provide.

Many will fail to see the hand of God's provision at work at times, but because we don't see it doesn't mean He doesn't do it. Garth Brooks the American Country and Western singer sings a song called "Unanswered Prayers" where he concludes that "some of God's greatest gifts are unanswered prayers."

b) God is Sovereign over his Creation

At the heart of our rich Presbyterian Tradition sits a core train of belief that God is Sovereign over all Creation. While some within as well as those outwith of the church today would seek to discredit any kind of notion of Creation much less one who was responsible for its inception. I have never felt the need to depart from this understanding. There is a story told of an old lady in England who had withstood the bombings of the Blitz with amazing courage. When asked the secret of her fortitude amidst such frightful danger, she replied "Well, every night I say my prayers and then I remember 'ow the parson told us God is always watching, so I go to sleep. After all, there's no need for two of us to lie awake."

Someone else postulated this theory, that in times of uncertainty it is good to know these simple facts from Isaiah 40: (Sextillion and Quintillion are numeric terms - vast numbers to say the least)

* The oceans of the world contain more than 340 quintillion gallons of water, yet God holds them "in the hollow of his hand" (Isaiah 40:12).

* The earth weighs 6 sextillion metric tons, yet God says it is but "dust on the scales" (Isaiah 40:15).

* The known universe stretches more than 30 billion light years (200 sextillion miles), but God measures it by the width of his hand (Isaiah 40:12).

* Scientists claim there are at least 100 billion galaxies and each galaxy is made up of about 100 billion stars. To such mind-boggling math Isaiah reminds us that God calls each star "by name" (Isaiah 40:26).

Bearing all that in Mind - If God can hold the waters of the ocean in the hollow of His hand, consider the weight of the Earth as but dust, measure the width of the Universe with span of his hand, and call each start by name, surely he can handle the details and dramas of our lives but more than that how can we not understand that He is Sovereign over his Creation?. Maybe that is why we can take the words of the Apostle Peter to heart... "Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time. Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you" (1 Peter 5:6-7).

In Matt 6: 32 we read of how Our Father in Heaven already knows our every need. When He is in Sovereign Control, that's what He can do.

c) Faith and Trust should overrule Doubt and/or Fear

As we get to the end of Matthew Chapter 6 Jesus leaves us with the guidance what is a priority, namely that we seek first God's Kingdom and righteousness and that all these other things may be added to you. The result of which will be that we need not worry.

Someone once said **"Worry is faith in the negative, trust in the unpleasant, assurance of disaster and belief in defeat...worry is wasting today's time to clutter up tomorrow's opportunities with yesterday's troubles."** Many today find it all too easy for worry and fear to predominate our lives failing to realise how easily it can bring a person down.

The Story is told of how a psychologist walked around a room during a teaching session on stress management. As she raised a glass of water, everyone expected to be asked "is the half empty or half full?" Instead, with a smile on her face, she inquired: "How heavy is this glass of water?"

The students offered a number of answers ranging from 8 oz. to 20 oz. She answered, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long I hold it. If I hold it for a minute, it's not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I'll have an ache in my arm. If I hold it for a day, my arm will feel numb and paralysed. In each case, the weight of the glass doesn't change, but the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes." She went on to say that the stresses and worries in life are like that glass of water. Think about them for a while and nothing happens. Think about them

a bit longer and they begin to hurt. And if you think about them all day long, you will feel paralysed - incapable of doing anything." It's important to remember to let go of your stresses. As early ... as you can, put all your burdens down. Don't carry them through the evening and into the night. Remember to put the glass down!
The Songwriter perhaps summed this up succinctly by suggesting "We let go and let God...

*"Storing up temporal treasures, Holding them as tight as we can
Only gives us passing pleasures, Then they slip through our hands
Hanging on to worldly deceptions, The only ones we fool are ourselves
When we've given up hope and we're in too deep,
There's only one thing that will help.
Let go and let God, Let Him have His way
With your life every day
Let go, let God
You can try on your own
But you'll find that there's no other way"*

When we read these words of Jesus in Matthew Chapter 6 we realise that the Call of Jesus in combating Fear and Worry is to have Faith and to Trust in God. If we have nothing to fear or worry about, there is no need for Faith and Trust. The reality in the world today is that there is much to be fearful of and to worry about but that we can, as the song writer wrote and the psychologist taught with a glass of water, we can let go of the stresses and trust that God in his sovereign power already has things in hand and in his provision give us the means by which we can ride through these moments of Worry and stress, whether that is related to Covid or some other health issue or uncertain times and job prospects as furloughs come to an end or the fears that world leaders might bring destruction upon us globally. Maybe we just need to seek God's Kingdom and his righteousness first all and all these other things will fall into place in God's good and perfect timing.
