**Letter from the Manse**

A warm welcome to you from our most recent Gazette which I hope you will enjoy reading giving you an insight into the things that are coming up in the new session.

Churches over the years have become more and more like schools in the way they operate. Very often, other than holiday clubs and the regular event of Sunday morning worship, congregations will close down with organisations following the schools having a six or eight week summer recess. We are living in interesting times these days with so many things having changed.

Our national church is looking to find ways that address how we can best seek to re-awaken the lapsed members of our congregations, those people who have lost that sense of relevance for church, the men and women who think the church has nothing to do or say for them anymore.

Of course, we should also be very pro-active in reaching out to those who have never been interested in the Christian message of God's *unmerited* Grace and Favour because of what Jesus achieved. The history of the church in Scotland has seen moments in the timeline of the ages where it seemed the very Spirit of God had fallen on the Land with men and women's lives changed as God by his Spirit moved hearts and minds.

Our local Churches have been superb in rising to the challenges of social need and social care for those less fortunate than others but we have over the years become ambivalent about Mission or Evangelism. Many of us would rather stay in our churches rather than be reaching out to those in our communities to challenge them about their lives today but their lives for eternity.

A story was once told of how the Devil was talking with his lieutenants about how best to stop people becoming Christians. One said we should persecute them severely. Another said we should get our politicians to make it illegal, another said we should tell them, there is no rush that there is plenty of time to decide. To this last minion, the devil said, "Go! You will ruin the lives of millions."

The Bible says

*“In an acceptable time I have heard you. And in the day of salvation I have helped you.” Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation. (2 Corinthians 6:2)*



We can be like the cartoon and stay in our churches for fear of being laughed at, or vilified for being a man or woman of faith in a society that is increasing tolerant of every view as long as it is not Christian/Evangelical or we can be courageous like the saints of old travelling any distance, taking every opportunity to share the Christian message of hope and eternity for all through faith in Jesus and Him only. I hope we and the church nationally makes the right

decision because I fear that if we don't, history will see the Church of Scotland continue to decline and that for me would be a story that saddens my heart when I would rather see my heart quicken at the sound of the gospel being proclaimed and lives being changed. For that to happen we can no longer sit in our churches and watch the world pass by.

## **Financial Report**

At the Board Meeting on the 5<sup>th</sup> September our treasurer, Peter Watson, reported that our regular income is down by over 8% compared to last year though our regular costs were similar to last year and were within our budget. He hopes that the planned Rededication Service to be held later this year will encourage members to slightly increase their givings to allow our regular income to match our normal costs.

In past years major items of expenditure such as the heating system or roof repairs was met by special Gift Days where the congregation was asked to give donations for a specific project. The capital spent this year to date is the culmination of smaller projects that we have avoided committing to over the last few years. Isobel Grieve's generous legacy of £10,000 received in December with a specific request for part of this to go towards refurbishment of the manse is now being used for this purpose and some of this is committed. Our Fabric and Reserves Fund has been used to fund the roughcasting of the gable end of the church hall, repair of the hall window ledges, repair of the projector in the sanctuary and replacement of the guttering on the hall.

Money has also been allocated to purchase of additional folding tables and storage trolleys, to reinstall the bell in the Tower, to refurbish both the meeting room to provide a separate vestry for the minister and the office in anticipation of a new secretary, and to clear the blockages in the drainage pipes.

He also reported that we had recently received a substantial legacy of over £60,000 from Ian Mitchell's will which he hopes that we will invest wisely to help grow the membership. The Board and Session have decided to replace the old grand piano in the Sanctuary with a new Clavinova in memory of Ian, recognising his great love of music.



## **The Church of Scotland General Assembly 2019 (18<sup>th</sup> to 24 May)**

As a first time Commissioner to the Assembly, I looked forward with anticipation, at the prospect of seeing the Church in action, driving us into the 21<sup>st</sup> century and apprehension, that everything would stall in legal jargon and filibuster! Both were correct.

On the first day there was a lot of pomp and ceremony as the guests of honour arrived though sitting in the assembly hall, we missed all this, hearing only the distant sounds of bagpipes. The outgoing Moderator, the Right Reverend Susan Brown, handed over the cross and ring of office to the Reverend Colin Sinclair, minister for Palmerston Place Church in Edinburgh. His Grace Richard Scott, the Duke of Buccleuch and Queensberry was Lord High Commissioner for the second year.

Monday began with the Sacrament of Communion and the other days with devotions. These were chosen to help us remember the reason why we were there, to serve God as well as the church. Then down to business!

Daily proceedings, flyers etc are handed out on the day to add to the 500+ page "blue book". This year's assembly contended with many controversial matters which were passionately presented and debated. One of the main topics was the Radical Action Plan which was passed after a heated debate which will result in fewer Presbyteries. Other sessions covered Youth, Church and Society, Chaplaincy to the Armed Forces, World Missions and Climate Change to name a few. Sitting through many hours of discussion, sometimes it was difficult to keep track on what was going on, where at times the change of a word, or punctuation raised heated exchanges! Overall, it was an experience that could be exhausting, engaging and boring and with six hundred people in the hall, it soon got hot, and after lunch, sleepy.

On the Thursday night I was one of the Commissioners selected to attend The Beating the Retreat and Reception hosted by The Lord High Commissioner at Holyrood Palace. One comment is that by the nature of proceedings it does narrow the field of those able to attend as most people under 65 are in employment and would find it difficult to become involved. That was evident by the demographics of the ages of attendees in the hall. If we want to encourage younger people into the church decision making, then I feel we need to look at moving into the 21<sup>st</sup> century and using the technology available for distance conferencing.
